

Father Tom's Letter

Dear Friends,

Today's gospel connects with a seasonal activity many of us engage in – gardening. Have you been tending to your gardens? Tilling the soil, planting seeds, feeding, watering, weeding? Jesus uses familiar actions to share his message. When you plant seeds, do you see immediate results? No, you need to wait – and tend to your garden as you wait. Have you ever been taken by surprise at how some of your plantings have bloomed beyond expectation? God often amazes us.

Jesus used seed planting and tending to help his followers – including us – to better understand the reign of God. Fr. Jude Siciliano, OP, says,

"The reign of God" is the gospel's way of describing God working in our lives, right here and now. Jesus brings a new way of living in which we become aware and respond to God's active presence in all the events of our life. Even when we don't see immediate results from our good works the parable encourages us to patience. When it seems nothing is changing we stay with our tasks because another Sower is present who is sowing seed that will grow and come to harvest -- eventually. Impatient people don't make good farmers; impatient disciples give up too easily. If Jesus were speaking to us today he would counter our impatience and discouragement and tell us, "Hang in there, I'm not finished yet."

So, as you're planting seeds in your gardens, and seeds of goodness among your family, friends and community, be patient! Perhaps this prayer by Anne Osdieck might help:

O, like the tiny mustard seed, grow us good roots. Dig down into our souls, bore into our hearts and minds. Grow into so large a plant that all of our actions, all of our ideas, all our loves, our selves, nestle and shelter in your branches.

Happy Father's Day! Today it is our joy to remember you with gratitude and to pray that you might continue to be instruments in God's hands as you pass on the Spirit's gifts of wisdom, understanding and knowledge to your children, grandchildren and godchildren.

At this time of year, we ask God's blessings on all who are celebrating graduations. Whether it's from preschool, high school, college, graduate school or anywhere in between, may God continue to bless and guide your journeys. Congratulations to all, including our SSPJ School students who graduate this week.

And, in honor of Father's Day...

Well the door opened, and it opened again and again and while I squeezed and pumped my fist to keep my blood flowing into the deposit bag, I was eyeing the body count ...34, 35, 36...oh no #37 rejected because his iron was too low ...and he pleaded – there's a shortage... but they held firm to their "sorry, no".

Needle out, bright green tape to let the world know, I gave! As I drank my apple juice and ate my Lorna Doones...the door opened, 37, 38....39, 40, 41...with a joy-filled heart I stepped outside the Office, looked up at the cross atop our church and said "thank-you".

Sister T's Reflection for Us All This Week and Always...

Dear Friends,

I have always been taken by the Word **Namaste**. There are several translations of the word but my favorite is **'the God in me greets the God in you'**. A connection came to mind while thinking about The central place the Eucharist has in the Catholic Church. During these years of the Eucharistic Revival we have been emphasizing the importance of knowing and believing in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. Do I really truly believe that when I receive Communion, I am receiving the 'real' body and blood of Christ?

Sometime actions become rote, and this can happen when we receive communion. What a sacred time, God is so physically present to us. Okay, what connection does it have with **Namaste**? The longer I thought, I realized that although we can sit for hours before the Blessed Sacrament or receive Communion daily, how do we take it out into the world to our home, workplace, schools etc.? We need to become that body of Christ, His hands and feet and heart. So therefore, when we say **Namaste**, we would truly be saying **'the God in me greets the God in you'.**

Ah, but do we believe that? Recently, I was talking to a friend who was presenting on the topic of negotiating. I shared with her my word and said **IF** we greeted each other with that image in mind all negotiating would be a lot easier. We would **LISTEN** to the other person. **HEAR** what they are saying and not be preparing out rebuttal while they were speaking to us. Imagine that! I would suggest that in most instances that is **NOT** the case. There seems to be an air of entitlement in our society today. Imagine if we greeted each other recognizing the presence of God in the other person, I think our families, workplaces, cities, churches, and the world would be much different places.

As we continue to ponder the mystery of the Eucharist and our part in "being' Eucharist, may we continue to become the hands, feet and heart of Christ and greet all with Namaste on our lips and in our hearts, I offer you this prayer, pray it frequently during the week:

Let us pray for the willingness to make present in our world the love of Christ shown to us in the Eucharist, Lord Jesus Christ, we worship you living among us in the sacrament of your body and blood. May we offer to our brothers and sisters a life poured out in loving service of that kingdom where you live with the Father and the Holy Spirit one God for ever and ever. Pray: Lord Jesus, thank you for the growth and peace you often bring through storms. Amen.

Prepare for the Storms in Our Lives

Springtime weather is unpredictable and dangerous in Tornado Alley, the Midwestern region of the United States. Destructive, violent winds and funnel-shaped clouds can wreak havoc communities. During storm season. on meteorologists do their best to watch and warn everyone when conditions look volatile so they can heed warnings, take appropriate shelter, and be prepared. Meteorologists carefully observe atmospheric conditions. windspeeds. and supercell thunderstorm circulation, but there is usually a lot of uncertainty about when, where, and if a "terrible twister" is coming. Sometimes, disaster is unavoidable even when people are prepared, and good people become victims of tragedy.

Life often throws unexpected storms our way. When we think everything is under control, we might face a sudden health scare, a job loss, a relationship crisis, or the heart-wrenching loss of a loved one. Then what?

We can weather storms by building shelters for spiritual support and peace before bad things happen. We can acknowledge our need for God the Father who made and loves us. We can develop and nurture a personal relationship with Jesus, our Lord and Savior, through study, prayer, participation in Mass, and receiving the sacraments. We can prepare by surrendering our hearts to the Holy Spirit, who is with us to guide and protect us against the evil snares of the devil. We can prepare our hearts to rely on God and to accept the things we cannot change with grace and peace, knowing that Christ keeps His promises to be with us always, even in the storms of life.



It is helpful to remember that the storms we face often draw us closer to God and teach us to rely on Him fully. When we suffer through storms, our reliance on divine help builds our hope and trust in Him, the "Father Almighty," whom we affirm in our

Profession of Faith at Mass. This journey of faith and resilience allows us to share our experiences with others who need help. Mark's Gospel reminds us not to be afraid and to be patient. As children of God, we are heirs of His grace and He promises to be with us always.

Reflect & Discuss:

- + How are you nurturing your shelter in Christ ahead of possible storms?
- + How have you waited for God's help during a storm, and what helped you be patient?
- + How have you shared the peace of Christ with others who are going through a storm?
- If God is Almighty and loves us, why do "storms" – bad things – still happen to good people?
- + How does Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection bring hope in life's storms? How does the Holy Spirit help in difficult situations?

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REACTING TO CRITICISM

In much of the secularized world today, we live in a climate that's somewhat anti-Christian and anti-church (as contradictory as this may sound in a culture that still considers itself Christian). But the truth is that in many circles today it is fashionable to bash Christianity, especially its churches, be they Roman Catholic, Protestant, or Evangelical. Invariably the criticism will focus on inconsistencies, faults, and historical sins inside these churches. Indeed, the expression, *I am spiritual but not religious*, carries a not-so-subtle critique of the churches. *I want God, but not Christianity and the churches*.

How serious is this? What's to be our response? While it's irritating, ultimately it's not a major cause for concern. As a church, we are not fundamentally threatened by this and we should not overreact. Why?

First, because a certain amount of this criticism does us good. We have real faults and shortcomings and our culture generously points them out. The present criticism of the church is healthily humbling us and pushing us towards a more courageous internal purification. Our critics show us our faults; they do us a favor. Besides, for too long we enjoyed a situation of privilege, never a good thing for the church. We tend to be healthier as Christians whenever we are living in a time of dis-privilege rather than in a time of privilege, albeit it isn't as pleasant. Moreover, there's something weightier at stake.

We must be careful not to overreact to the present anti-ecclesial climate because this can lead to an unhealthy defensiveness and put us too much in the position of adversary vis-a-vis the culture. That's not where the gospel wants us to be, not at all. Our task instead is to absorb this criticism, painful though it can be, gently point to its unfairness, but resist every temptation to be overly defensive. Why? Why not aggressively defend ourselves?

Because we are strong enough not to, pure and simple. We can withstand this without having to become hard and defensive. No matter how prevalent or unfair the criticism, the church is not about to go under or away any time soon. We are more than two billion Christians in the world, stand within a two-thousandyear-old tradition, have among ourselves a universally accepted scripture, have two thousand years of doctrinal entrenchment and refinement, have massive centuries-old institutions, are embedded in the very roots of Western culture and technology, constitute one of the biggest multi-national groups in the world, and are growing in numbers worldwide. We are hardly a reed shaking in the wind, reeling, a ship about to go under. We are strong, stable, blessed by God, an elder in the culture. Because of this we owe the culture graciousness and understanding.

Beyond that, and more important than our historical strengths, is the fact that we have Christ's promise to be with us and the reality of the resurrection to sustain us. Given all this, I think it's fair to say that we can absorb a fair amount of criticism without fear of losing our identity. Moreover, we must not let this criticism make us lose sight of why we exist in the first place.

The church does not exist for its own sake or to ensure its own survival. It exists for the sake of the world. We can too easily forget this and, in all sincerity, lose sight of what the gospel asks of us. For example, compare these two responses: at a press conference, someone once asked the late Cardinal Basil Hume what he considered the foremost challenge facing the church today. He replied: "To save the planet." Some years later, another Cardinal (unnamed here because of his answer) in a television interview was asked roughly the same question, "What do you see as your first task in taking over this diocese?" His reply: "To defend the faith." A very different answer, clearly.

Everything about Jesus suggests that Hume's view is closer to the gospel than the other. When Jesus says, *my flesh is food for the life of the world*, he is telling us that the major task of the church is not to defend itself, to ensure its continuity, or to keep the world from grinding it up. The church exists for the sake of the world, not for its own sake. That's why Jesus was born in a trough, a place where animals come to eat, and it's why he gives himself on a table, to be eaten. Being ground up is part of what Jesus is about. Everything about him suggests vulnerability over defensiveness, risk over safety, trust in a divine promise over any human defense and insurance.

The very essence of the gospel is a call to risk beyond defensiveness, to absorb what's unjust, to not be defensive-*Forgive them for they know not what they do*. We are meant to be food for the world, not anxious about our own survival. We must be the food of understanding, graciousness, and forgiveness for the world.
